Temperance Sunday

This Sunday, three days before Lent begins, is called Temperance Sunday. Followers of Jesus, like ourselves, look at our lives to see if there are any areas that require greater self discipline. Jesus asks us to improve prayer, fasting and good works. Lent is about what we do and how we live for

Christ. As you join us for Mass this Sunday, you are invited to begin to reflect on addressing some area of your life that needs improvement and allow God's grace to help you be a better Christian person this Lent.

Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes

This Sunday, 11th February, is the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. As part of the 10am Mass on Tuesday the Sacrament of the Sick will be celebrated. We particularly invite those in our parish who are sick or infirm in some way to come to this



Mass for Anointing of the Sick. The parish statue of our Lady of Lourdes has been placed in front of the altar.

Ash Wednesday Masses at 10am and 7pm Ashes Distributed 2pm to 5pm



Next Wednesday is Ash Wednesday. It is a day of fast and abstinence and marks the beginning of Lent. There will be Masses at 10am and 7pm.

People will have the option of receiving ashes on their foreheads or taking home a little ash to apply it themselves. The priests of the parish will also be available with ashes in Ashbourne Church from 2pm to 5pm on Wednesday. This time is also an opportunity for the sacrament of confession as parishioners embark on the Lenten opportunity of spiritual renewal. Why not get Lent off to a great start by making a good confession as you receive the ash and start the Lenten journey?





The Lenten billboards will be displayed from Ash Wednesday. Our churches will also have a Lenten desert scene to encourage parishioners to enter into the journey and awakening of Lent. Purple is the traditional colour of



Lent and our priests wear purple vestments at most liturgies over the next 40 days. Purple represents the call to renew our lives spiritually, and to reflect on what it is that Christ achieved for us through his passion and death. During this season the Alleluia and Gloria are no longer said or sung at Mass and flowers on the sanctuary are kept at a minimum. This is all part of us 'stripping ourselves' back to the essentials and 'entering the desert' of Lent.

The Stations of the Cross



Each Friday evening of Lent there are public Stations of the Cross at 7pm in Ashbourne Church. Reflections are posted again this year beside each of the fourteen

stations. The stations remind us of the 'Way of Jesus' and invite us to find our 'Way to Jesus'. You are encouraged this Lent to use the stations as a means of meditation. As you make a sacrifice of your time to follow Jesus' journey, rise above everyday stresses by expressing gratitude and love to Jesus for His supreme sacrifice on Good Friday. 'We adore You O Christ and we praise You because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the world'.


Cleaning of Ashbourne Church This Shrove Tuesday

The Story Behind St. Valentine



As St. Valentine's Day is celebrated on Ash Wednesday it is worth reflecting on the man behind the name. Valentine was a priest in Rome. According to the Roman martyrology, Valentine died for the faith, 14th February 269, under Claudius II, the Emperor at the time. The martyrology says: "At Rome, on the

Flaminian Way, the heavenly birthday of the blessed martyr Valentine, a priest. After performing many miraculous cures and giving much wise counsel he was beaten and beheaded under Claudius Caesar." The Roman Emperor Claudius II forbade the young men to marry because he thought single men were better soldiers. Valentine secretly married young couples and was arrested and put in prison. The threat of death could not induce Valentine to renounce his faith. While in prison he prayed for and healed the blind daughter of a judge, Asterius, who with his family converted to Christianity and suffered martyrdom with Valentine. In 498AD Pope Gelasius named February 14th St. Valentine's Day. A Basilica was built in his honour near the cemetery of St. Hippolytus where his remains were found. In the nineteenth century, a relic of the saint was given to the Carmelite Church in Whitefriar Street, and married couples celebrating significant anniversaries visit this Irish shrine of St. Valentine to renew their vows. The crocus, which flowers about this time of year, is also known as St. Valentine's flower.

Getting Married in the Coming Months?

Any couple getting married in the coming months are asked to make sure that they do their pre marriage course and the church paperwork in plenty of time. This is to ensure that all is organised and the couple can focus on planning their



ceremony in the church with their priest in the months coming up to the wedding. Our priests meet brides and grooms to be on a Saturday afternoon in the Parish Office.
