EASTER

The Easter Octave ends today on this Second Sunday of Easter which is traditionally known as 'Low Sunday'. Some Catholics call today 'Doubting Thomas' Sunday as on this day every year we hear of Jesus' appearance eight days after Easter Sunday to St. Thomas the Apostle. The Easter Octave ends but the season continues until Pentecost Sunday so at Masses we continue to celebrate the resurrection of Christ. The paschal candle is prominent, the priest's vestments are white and the Alleluia is sung with

enthusiasm. During this season the Book of the Acts of the Apostles is read at Masses and speaks to us of the early days of the church.




Divine Mercy Sunday

On this Second Sunday of Easter we also mark Jesus' Divine Mercy. Pope St John Paul II established this devotion. As you look at he Divine Mercy Icon reflect on the message at the base of the painting 'Jesus I trust in You.' Note our Saviour's right hand raised in blessing and his left hand pointing to His Sacred Heart. The red rays that stream out of Jesus' heart symbolises His blood and the pale blue rays represent the water that justifies souls. St. Faustina, who received this revelation, said that the strongest of faith



is of no avail without works. We are asked to exercise divine mercy in three ways, the first by deed, the second by word, and the third in prayer. The Divine Mercy Icon that hangs in our Church is blessed at masses this Sunday. At 3 o'clock the Divine Mercy Chaplet will be led in Ashbourne Church.

Improving Our Church Environment for Children

Two beautiful presses were installed in the Lady Chapel of Ashbourne Church just before Holy Week. These presses now give the children who serve Mass a separate press for the white albs that they wear for their ministry. The presses



also give Ashbourne Church more storage space for our sacred liturgical vessels. The installation of this furniture is part of our commitment to improving the church environment for children involved in ministry in Ashbourne Church We thank all our Mass Servers and their parents for their commitment to our parish.

Feast of the Annunciation and the Angelus

On Monday morning we remember how the Archangel Gabriel appeared to Mary and revealed that she was chosen to be mother of the Lord. Mary was open to God's will in her life saying 'Let thy will be done'. Usually



this feast is celebrated on March 25th, exactly 9 months out from the feast of Jesus' birth, but with that date falling during Holy Week it takes place on the first day outside of the Easter Octave. The Angelus is prayed by Catholics at 12 noon and 6pm each day. It commemorates the Incarnation and is linked to the biblical passages of the Annunciation and the Visitation. In Eastertide it is replaced by the Regina Coeli. All devotees are asked to ponder the words of this prayer and renew their commitment to praying the Angelus and spreading goodwill among all of God's people.



Our Easter faith contains a commissioning: to spread the Good News —How will you be an apostle during the Easter season? Ten ideas ... 1. Do a Random Act of kindness 2. Challenge a negative atmosphere by being enthusiastic! 3. Make a donation

to a religious charity like Trócaire or St. Vincent de Paul 4. Let go of a long standing grudge 5. Re-evaluate your work patterns. How can they be more just and life giving? 6. Volunteer to read at Mass 7. Put yourself in another's shoes. Work hard at overcoming a deeply-ingrained prejudice. 8. As you walk along the streets, keep your head up and give people eye-contact, smiles and hellos. 9. Lighten up! Place your biggest worry in God's hands. 10. Be an 'Easter presence' to a person who is feeling down.

Enrolment in Our Parish After School Program

Enrolment by parents of their children in after school parish sacramental classes for the next academic year begins this Tuesday evening. Fr. Michael and Kay Churm, the parish co-ordinator, will hold a meeting for all interested parents in Ashbourne Church at 8pm. Registration and Request Forms for the Sacraments of 1st Confession, Communion and Confirmation will be available on the night. Places in the classes are given on a first come first served basis and completed forms should be returned to the Parish Office before the end of May. A two- year program of catechesis takes place both for the sacrament of Holy Communion and

Confirmation following Meath diocesan sacramental policy. For eleven years the parish has run these classes and is grateful to Kay, the teachers and parents who work with the priests in providing this opportunity to pass on the faith to children.
